My ForeFlight says 163 nm and goal is arrive at 11:30 CST which will be a couple of hours prior to full eclipse. With aircraft having various speeds, it will be up to PIC to determine their departure time to arrive at 11:30 CST. Of course, everyone can go early and stay late, as well!!

So, we are recruiting aircraft, pilots and passengers! Please reach out to me, as I will be matching availability of aircraft seats and passengers. I realize this is coming quickly, but hope to have a good turn-out for this rare event!

I've spoken with FBO Midwest Aviation (618-993-2764), who iare advising to <u>bring a box lunch</u> as there is no restaurant on the airport, and it may be difficult to get ground transportation. They are trying to arrange catering at FBO but no commitment at this time.

Additionally, viewing glasses are needed and starting to be in short supply. I'm told they can be purchased locally but I don't have any knowledge of this. And please, be careful, there are a lot of fake glasses being talked about in the media.
