The chapter would like to thank Mike Williams for his help in securing a donation of a Graham/Lee replica of a Nieuport 11 replica. We had an awesome field trip with our youth to pick this aircraft up and relocate to the Columbus Municipal Airport.



Currently we are in the process of cleaning and taking stock of what we have here. We will then determine our best options for how to make use of this replica. Options include using the engine as a rebuild training tool and the airframe for learning other build techniques (e.g. fabric repair & painting). Or we could sell this to fund other activities.



We continue to pursue various Grant Proposals for a Basic Airplane Training Device (BATD) and an RV12iS airplane kit. All communication with the foundation(s) have been very positive we are waiting for final determination votes by their Board of Directors which should occur later this month. We are anticipating that some amount of fundraising will be required on our chapter's

part so we have formed a committee of various board members to help start planning to address not only our endowment targets but also any potential matching funds required on our part to support these projects. As a chapter, we are in a great position and these types of activities creates tremendous opportunities & projects to engage many of our members broad interests in aviation.

Our Young Eagles Flights this year were a resounding success. We provided free flights to 271 youth 2023. This was one of our largest numbers of Young Eagle Flight in memory. We as a chapter have provided over 3000 flights since our participation in this event started in 1998. None of this would be possible without our volunteer pilots, ground/ramp crews, registration, logbooks, photographers, etc. A heartfelt thanks to all of our volunteers, this is something our chapter can be very proud of.

### **Ray Scholars Update**

Its been a slow month for our scholars, the Bakalar Flying Club's Cessna 150 has been down for a number of unplanned repairs and annual inspection. Hopefully we are able to get our student-pilots back in the air soon.

In December we will be making our Ray Scholarship Matching Grant application to the EAA for awarding scholarships in 2024.

### **TAYLORCRAFT & NIEUPORT 11 UPDATE**

The team continues to make progress on the Taylorcraft restoration. Interior seat installation should begin this week. The fairings that close the gap between the wing and fuselage need to be reconstructed, the original fairings are pretty beat up and do not enclose these gaps neatly.

The team has started to relocate some of the Nieuport flight control surfaces to the Youth Aviation Center for cleaning and evaluating their condition. The engine cowling has been removed to get our first look at the Continental c85 engine. We need to determine the overall condition of the engine to understand what our options are to best utilize it. In the mean time there is still a couple years of grime to remove and the youth are hard at it.
